Valentine's Day with a Japanese Twist

Marlborough's Sister City partnership with Akiruno-shi in Tokyo has fostered meaningful cultural exchanges and educational programs, particularly at Whitcomb Middle School, building bridges of mutual understanding and friendship between our communities. This connection makes it a perfect time to explore one of Japan's most interesting cultural adaptations: their unique take on Valentine's Day. While Valentine's Day in the West is all about roses and romantic dinners, Japan has put its own spin on the holiday. Introduced by chocolate companies in the 1930s and popularized through department store campaigns in the 1960s, Valentine's Day in Japan traditionally features women giving chocolates to men—a custom that emerged during the feminist movement era when Japanese women were encouraged to take more initiative in romantic relationships.

What started as a confession of love has evolved into a chocolate-giving phenomenon with its own vocabulary: giri choco (obligation chocolates for bosses and teachers), honmei choco (chocolates for that special someone), and newer categories like tomo choco (friend chocolates) and even jibun choco (chocolates you buy for yourself). The chocolate industry has successfully transformed Valentine's Day into an event where everyone participates, but interestingly, Japan reserves its most romantic celebrations for Christmas rather than February 14th. That's when the fancy dinners and jewelry purchases happen, leaving Valentine's Day to be primarily about the chocolates themselves—a delicious tradition that keeps evolving with Japanese culture while maintaining its distinctly local flavor.

Presidents and Future Presidents Visit Marlborough

February 16th is Presidents' Day, an ideal time to reflect on Marlborough's connections to the nation's highest office.

Marlborough's presidential history begins in the colonial era, when Williams Tavern served as a key stop along the Post Road between Boston and New York. On July 2, 1775, George Washington passed through town while traveling to Cambridge to take command of the Continental Army. Years later, Washington returned as president, dining at Williams Tavern on October 23, 1789.

The city continued to welcome national leaders into the 20th century. President William Howard Taft visited Marlborough in 1912, followed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1936 during the height of the New Deal.

Marlborough has also hosted several future presidents. In 1958, then, Senator John F. Kennedy visited the city as his national profile was rising. In 1975, Georgia Governor Jimmy Carter made a campaign stop in Marlborough while seeking the presidency.

The most recent presidential visit came on April 1, 2010, when President Barack Obama made a surprise stop at Marlborough Airport amid record rainfall across Massachusetts. Obama waved to residents before traveling to the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency in Framingham, where he thanked emergency workers responding to widespread flooding.

Together, these visits highlight Marlborough's unique place in American history.

Sock Target

The game Sock Target is a simple, low-cost activity that is perfect for families with young children. Just roll old socks into balls and use buckets or boxes as targets.

Players stand behind a line on the floor and, taking turns, throw the sock balls trying to land them inside the containers. Each hit is worth one point and is celebrated with cheers.

Besides being fun, the game helps develop motor coordination, attention, sense of distance, and respect for rules. It also teaches children to wait their turn and to cheer for others.

The game can have variations: different-sized buckets can be worth different points, challenges using only one hand, or even targets marked with colors, letters, or numbers.

More than counting points, Sock Target shows that with simple household items it is possible to create joyful moments, strengthen family bonds, and turn an ordinary afternoon into a happy family memory.

Better Together:
The Benefits of Companion Planting

Winter is a great time for garden planning. You can sketch out new garden layouts, leisurely investigate new plants that you may wish to add, and daydream about relaxing in your beautiful nature retreat!

One garden technique worth exploring is companion planting, which involves placing two or more mutually beneficial plants close together in your garden to boost plant health and deter pests or attract beneficial insects. This style of gardening can also make better use of smaller garden spaces and improve soil health. For example:

- Planting nasturtiums alongside squash plants can help reduce squash bugs.
- Adding pollinator magnets like lavender, zinnias, and sunflowers will attract bees and other pollinators to plants throughout your garden.
- Planting basil near tomatoes can repel flies and mosquitoes. Borage is thought to deter tomato worms and improve tomato growth and flavor.

You can learn more on February 11 when Gretel Anspach, Trustee of the Massachusetts Horticultural Society and Lifetime Master Gardener, will speak on the benefits of companion planting at the Marlborough Public Library at 7pm in the Grice Community Room. The session, hosted by the Marlborough Garden Club, is free and the public is invited to attend.

Panthers Poised for Playoffs

Twelve games into the 2025–2026 season, the Marlborough High Panthers boys hockey team has emerged as one of the top programs in the league. The Panthers currently boast an impressive 9-2-1 overall record and sit at 6-1-1 in MID WACH "B" play, placing them firmly in first place in the division.

Marlborough opened the season on a strong note with back-to-back wins over Haverhill and Algonquin before suffering its first setback, a 6-2 loss on the road against Wachusett. Rather than falter, the Panthers responded with resilience, putting together an eight-game unbeaten streak (8-0-1). That run included a key road victory over division rival Groton-Dunstable on December 22, as well as a thrilling 2-1 overtime win against crosstown rival Hudson High on January 10th.

Head coach Mike O'Brien credits the team's success to a combination of strong goaltending and experience. Axel Rydberg and Landry Guenard have anchored the Panthers in net, while seniors Tom Massalski, Anthony Tramontozzi, and Liam Byrne have provided leadership and production. Contributions from underclassmen have also added valuable depth.

With eight games remaining, five of them at Navin Arena, Marlborough is positioning itself for a potential deep playoff run into March.
